The Bullseye Class Association was formed April 21, 1961

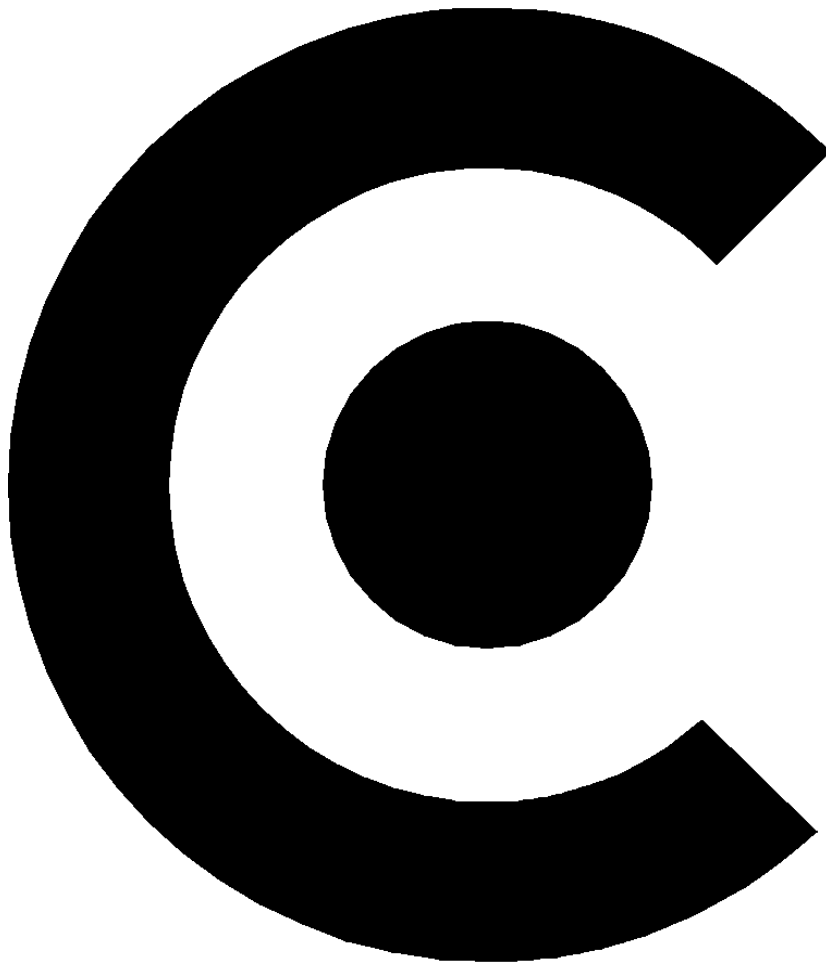


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
